"Where there's smoke"... around LHS this happens to be in the school bathrooms. A certain group of teachers, more famously known as the "Potty Patrol," have recently been stationed in the bathrooms in the morning.

Smoking is a national problem that is continually on the uprise. In a study made in Los Angeles, California, it was found that more students are smoking and starting at younger ages.

The typical 5th grade class had one student out of twenty smoking regularly. By the time they reached the 6th grade, the average had increased to one out of every five students. The percentage increases rapidly between the ages of thirteen to eighteen years.

LHS is no exception and the administration is doing their best to control the problem. But the fact is - students are going to smoke no matter what kind of laws or enforcements are laid down.

Several students have inquired if it would be possible to set up a designated area for those who want to smoke. It should be noted that students have had, in recent years, a smoking area (remember the Corner?) But this was taken away when several students abused their privileges and complaints forced an end to this smoking area.

Mr. Larson feels that supervision has had some effect on student smoking, especially in the morning. But it does have its setbacks. For example, if a teacher catches or suspects a student of smoking, it is his or her word against that student and often his parents. It is Mr. Larson who has to make the final decision about what action to take and he tries to be as fair as possible.

He feels that the only way to solve the problem would be to have constant supervision. This would be both costly and time consuming.

Other remarks that were made gave this general idea. "As long as the administration won't let us go out to the corner, what do they expect?"

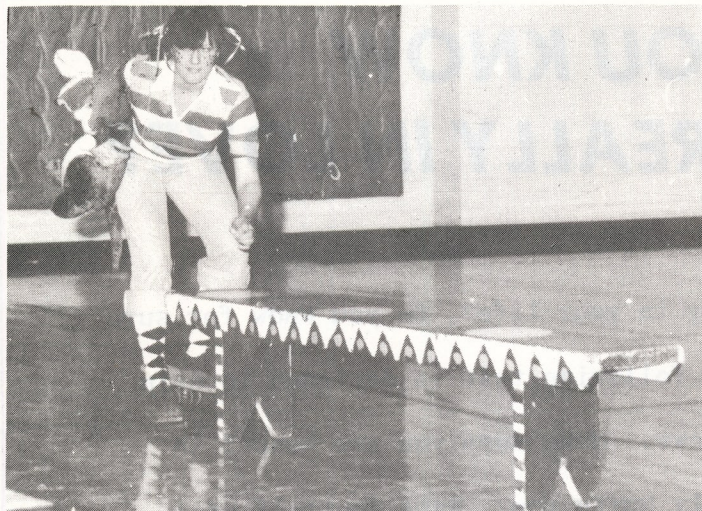

HOW DO YOU KNOW WHEN YOU ARE REALLY IN LOVE?

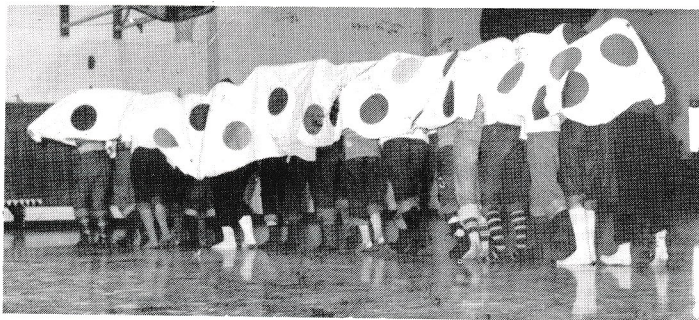

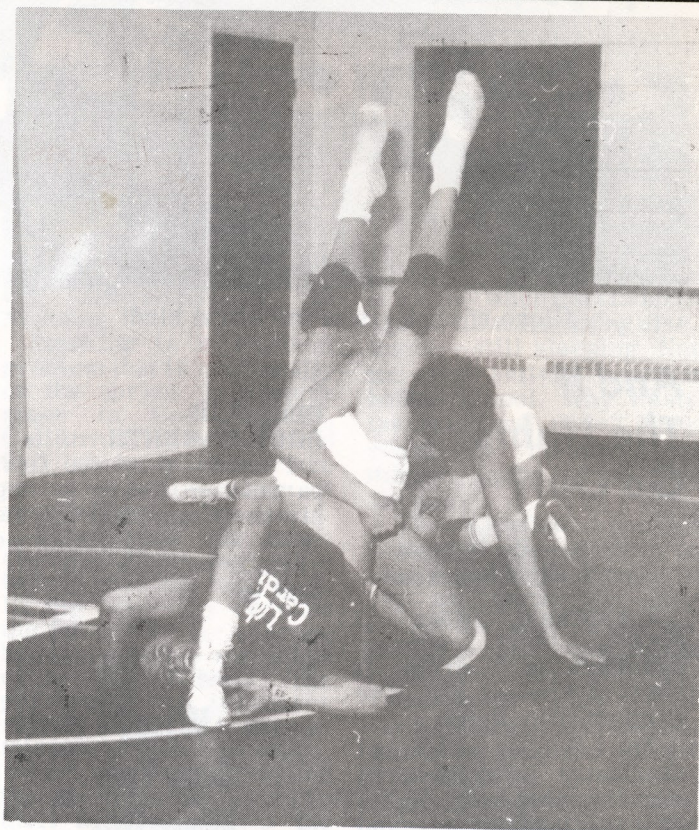
High scorers for the Grantsburg game were Jim Sorenson tallying 15 points, and Ron Steen close behind bringing in 12 points.
